Some Opposition. Misrepresentations



During the past few weeks certain statements have been made by the opposition canvassers and from the platform by opposition speakers, which have been so contrary to the facts of the case, that it would seem almost needless to contradict them if they had not persisted in as they have. Accordingly I am taking

this opportunity of hitting them in the head. One report that has been circulated in this district is that the Reciprocity Agreement is an iron-clad contract that cannot be terminated for twenty-one years. This is absolutely untrue. The following sentence is a quotation directly from the terms of the agreement which must at once set at rest the doubts anyone may have as to this provision :- "Neverthelesss, it is distinctly understood that we do not attempt to bind for the future the action of the United States Congress or the Parliament of Canada, but that each of these authorities shall be absolutely free to make any change of tariff policy or any other-matter-covered by the present arrangement that may be deemed necessary."

Another statement, that is being made by certain canvassers who are opposed to the Reciprocity Agreement, is that the Agreement allows American fishermen practically free fishing in Canadian waters. This also is absolutely untrue. The only provision in the agreement which deals in any way with the fishing privileges is one which allows United States fishermen who are fishing outside the three-mile limits to land on the Canadian shore for the purpose of buying bait and drying their nots. For this privilege the nominal sum of one dollar (\$1.00) per annum is charged. No other privileges are allowed to the United States

fishermon than they have at the present time. Mr. Henderson has stated from the platform that I am not entitled to vote in this County. How Mr. Henderson could make such a statement without a careful investigation of the matter is more than I can understand, but the statement is untrue. If Mr. . Henderson had taken the trouble to look it up, he would have found my name upon the votors' list of 1910 for the polling sub-division No. 8, Trafalgar Township, Page 22, No. 146, entitled to vote at both Municipal elections and elections for the Logislative Assembly.

Mr. Honderson has also attempted at every meeting he has held to make light of and throw discredit upon the price statistics which we published in this paper some three weeks ago. These figures were taken from the Government Report brought down on July 26th, 1911, before the House of Commons was dissolved, and neither Mr. Henderson nor any other member of the opposition dared question its reliability.

A striking example of Mr. Henderson's method is shown inghis treatment of the price quotations of hay. Our figures, given in this paper three weeks ago, show by quoting the prices for baled hay in Toronto and Ituffalo, that the Buffalo price averaged about \$5.00 per ton higher than the Toronto price. Mr. Henderson quoted the price of loose hay in Toronto and compared it with the price of baled bay in Buffalo, attempting to show by this absurd comparison that the Toronto market was the higher-priced market. Such methods, employed for the distinct purpose of deceiving his heavers us to the true conditions of the markets in Canada and the United States, cannot long headwink the public. Surely when the opposition to this agreement is forced to resort to deception and trickery, its case must be very hard pressed indeed.

I am endeavoring to secure as many copies as possible of the actual Reciprocity Agreement for distribution in Halton County, and a careful study of this will make such attempts to misrepresent its real nature more and more difficult.
