With the Boys In England

Bramshill Camp, Liphook, Eng., December 28th, 1915.

Mr. J. M. Moore, Editor of "Herald."

Dear Friend—At writing you some months ago, we had been in England for four weeks to-day, having arrived at Plymouth via the "California" on Oct. 21st. We had a very fine voyage, and I must say I enjoyed it immensely. We made what is considered good time, landing on the eighth day after leaving Quebec, which was doubtless due to excellent weather which attended us throughout.

On arrival at Plymouth we entrained for Liphook, though we did not know where we were bound for until we arrived there. The English coaches appear very poor compared to those of Canadian railways, but they are clean and the ground. From Liphook we travelled a couple of miles to camp, where we were told to pitch our tents, which we did quite comfortably, although not to be compared to home. I might note considerable space in describing this country but suffice it to say that it is very beautiful even in the winter season. The English people are kindred to us generally speaking, treat us very kindly.

I had the privilege of visiting old London about a week ago, and spent five days very enjoyable indeed visiting places of interest. Among other places I visited the Tower of London, the British Museum, Westminster Abbey, the Palace of Parliament and the Victoria and Albert Museum. It was a most interesting five days I ever had and was deeply impressed by what I saw. I think there is nothing to compare to young Canadians as such a visit to the hub of the Empire, of which Canada so proudly forms a part.

I guess I will have to close for present, wishing you and yours a very happy New Year, I remain,
