abroad to do your duty and bring you credit

regret and sympathy go to you, and we  
trust that you may have a safe jour-  
ney to where you are now, and that

see fit to spare you and bring you safely  
home again, after your work has been  
completed.

the waterworks system of Georgetown,  
and other duties assigned by the Council,

secretary of the Hydro System and  
collector of water rates and taxes, but  
was unable to get a second to his  
motion.

Council adjourned.

**Military**

Gunner Harold O'Brien of Kingston,  
was home last week end. He expects to  
leave for overseas shortly.

Mrs. H. Cardinal, Georgetown, re-  
ceived word from Ottawa on Monday  
that her son Pte. Joe Fry of the 126th  
Batt. was dangerously wounded.

On Monday Editor White, of the Re-  
former, received notice from Ottawa that  
his second son, Lance Corp. Fred G.  
White, who went overseas with the 78th  
Batt., was ill in a hospital in France,  
with grave, caused by shell shock.

Dr. Carlisle, Campbellville, has re-  
ceived word that his son, Lieut. Carlisle  
is missing, and there are indications that  
he has been shot down from his aero-  
plane. Once before he fell with the  
machine, but sustained no serious in-  
juries.

Lt. J. L. Carlisle is reported killed.

The "Herald" received the following  
communication from Pte. H. Holton,  
O'Connell, 242nd Batt., O.C. Army P.O.,  
London, Eng., dated Jan'y 10th, 1917:—  
"Was in barracks for 7 weeks at Moor-  
head, reached England the last of Nov-  
ember, had a good voyage on the "Man-  
chester." 5 days only coming across. Had  
16 days leave in London just before Xmas  
Christmas in camp was very lively, also  
New Year's day. Expected to cross the  
channel in a few days. Will Lewis and  
J. Sheppard are both here in Witley  
camp."
