**Inquest Concluded.**  
The adjourned inquest relating to the fatal aeroplane accident was concluded at the town hall yesterday morning. County Crown Attorney-Dick, Coroner J. J. R. Nixon and Constable McDonald laid charges of the proceedings. After hearing the evidence of Dr. Nicholl, A. B. Castill, A. Baker, Olive Basha, Samuel Gould, and three aviators including Captain Shilburne, the jury of which Mr. A. O'Connell was foreman, returned the following verdict:  
"We, the jury chosen to inquire into the death of Mrs. Isabella Cook, find that she died as a result of the crash of a biplane on Nov. 18th by being struck with the propeller of an aeroplane operated by Captain Shilburne on 11/17. We find no blame attached to Captain Shilburne, but would recommend that the aviators who are possible understand the warning when given before ascending, and also that the public use greater precaution when gallivanting around aeroplanes."
