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Obituary

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ARCHIBALD PATTERSON THOMPSON

The news of the sudden death of Mr. Archibald Thompson, Mill Street, on Monday evening came as a great surprise to his many friends here. Mr. Thompson had been suffering from a severe cold all winter, but took which resembled a stroke and from that time gradually sank until death came on Sunday evening about seven o'clock. A. P. Thompson was the son of the late Arthur Thompson and was born on Oct. 2, 1871, in Edinburgh, Scotland. He spent his early days and forty-three years ago he was married to Miss Mary Johnson. Two children blessed this union, a baby boy, who died in infancy, and Margaret, who has been the constant comfort and companion of her father during the past twelve years. Twelve years ago Mr. Thompson retired from business at Ballinacree and had purchased his home in Acton, where Mrs. Thompson passed away before they were settled in the new home. For about twenty years deceased conducted a hotel at Ballinacree. In this business he increased the number of customers by refusing liquor to all persons whom he considered had all that was good for them. He enjoyed general esteem and many friends here. For a number of years he was engaged in gathering cream for the Milton Creamery in this area. A much sympathy is felt for Miss Thompson who, by her father's death is left alone in the home. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Mr. Wilson officiating. Interment took place at Ballinacree.

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
