A BILL before the Quebec Legislative Assembly proposes to make it an offence, punishable by fine of \$100 or imprisonment, for any person to listen to or acquire knowledge of any conversation or message carried by telephone companies and without proper authorisation divulges or makes public the same. On "party lines" it has been a somewhat common habit for neighbors to listen to what is passing over the wires between families. The adoption of a like measure in Ontario would no doubt be regarded as a gross infringement on personal liberty.

SIR WILLIAM HEARST, Minister of Agriculture, introduced a bill in the Legislature providing for a tax on dogs, with the object of protecting the sheep-raising industry. The minimum is to be \$2 on dogs and \$4 on hitches, and municipalities will have the right to increase the amount as they see fit by-law. Sir William explained that municipalities would be responsible for the full loss of sheep owners in the event of sheep being killed by dogs. J. C. Elliott, West Middlesex, asked if there was any limit that might be allowed for an individual sheep, and Sir William replied that there should be some limit to the maximum tax, as some Township Councils might be disposed to make it prohibitive to keep dogs. He asked about arbitrators to determine the value of the sheep destroyed, and the Minister of Agriculture said a number of good arbitrators would be named for different parts of the province.

She bore her years of suffering with great cheerfulness, and joyfully to witness the long life of her faithful and loving mother, an aged husband and one daughter, Mrs. J. J. Owens, of Georgetown. She was a member of the Methodist Church from girlhood. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Trux, assisted by the Rev.
