At the annual sale of Ayrshire pure bred bull calves in Scotland, 21 bull calv es were offered, and all of them were from cows whose yearly yield of milk was over 1000 gallone, which allowing 80 days off for the dry period gave a daily flow of 3 2-8 gallons. One nine months-old call brought \$1 150, and another one year old sold for \$1500. Its dam had a record of 1156 gallons of milk in 48 weeks, yielding 3.67 per cent of butter fat. Mention is also made of an Ayshire cow whose flow constitutes a world record. In 9 seasons she gave 9500 gallons of milk and calved on an average within 12 monthe. On account of the great scarcity of cows there is little opportunity of weeding out pure milkers, but with the return of normal times this will be one of the objects simed at. proved either thieves or fools, so he Grocers to be Licensed An order has been issued by the Chairman of the Canada Food Board, bringing the retail grocers of the Dominion under license. On and after May I it will be illegal for any retail grocer to carry on business without a license from the Food Board. The regulations in regard to this trade are similar to those covering the licensing of other retail dealers, except that the last day for licensing of retail grocers has been fixed at May I, while the other trades will not be under license until May 15.
