*Noel's Township of Esquinton*

A cap of much interest to sheep raisers was tried on Monday at the City Hall, Toronto, before Justice Sir Glenval Falkinbridge. The case was as follows:

— About 17 March 1917, 24 sheep belonging to Dr. Noble were killed by dogs on property rented by Dr. Noble from the U. O. College, and an affidavit filed with the Clerk of the usual way.

At the meeting of Council on the 19th March the Council objected to paying the claim, but because the affidavit did not say the dogs were unknown, the court directed that diligent research was made for the owners in the Statute requires. 2nd. That the property on which said sheep were killed did not contribute anything to the revenue of the Township (being exempt from taxation) and therefore not entitled to compensation under the Sheep Protection Act. Mr. McMaster for Plaintiff, Mr. Macdonald and Royle Defense for Defendants. Judge remitted. The fact of the judgment of the Judge regarding his decision justifies the Council in the stand they took. The decision will be important.
