A column of the late Lance-Corporal Mino, who died at the front, is reproduced in this issue. It is with deep regret and a most sympathetic heart that I am called upon to write you a letter of this nature, but as a friend of your late son, I feel it is no less than my duty to offer to you not only my sympathy but the sympathy of all the officers and men who have in any way become acquainted with your boy. I can assure you that he was beloved by all his comrades and envied for his conscientious habits, smart initiative and wonderful spirit of bravery, that all tends to show his entire devotion to duty. His only thought was for the men under his care, and nothing was too good for them, but in return he demanded the trust and confidence of every man. The sad news came to me as a blow from a blacksmith's hammer, as I had not only been a friend of Alex's, but we had learned to love each other as brothers, but we must remember that God moves in a mysterious way and we are but poor weak earthly things whose entire destiny lies in the hands of the God of all.

The day has come when we must all be prepared to die and if the latter is our lot it must be remembered that by paying the supreme sacrifice we are doing a greater service than could possibly be done in any lifetime. I will close my letter with the prayer that God will be very near to you all in this dark hour and that strength will be given you to fight the good fight as your dear son has done.
