We are glad to know that patriotism prevailed at the meetings of the farmers held here the past week. Some resolutions which would have thrown the farmers in a bad light as a class were voted down. A vote of confidence in the Government would have been in order.

The annual meeting of the Enquessing Women's Institute was held in the Enquessing Council Chamber on Friday, May 16th. Altho the weather was very showery there was a good attendance. Members and friends brought in all the work for Red Cross and Soldiers comforts, which amounted to 16 suits pyjamas and 48 pr socks. The financial report for the year was read; also report of the "Helping Hand" and the Secretary's report. Votes of thanks were passed for Mr Moore for his kindness and courtesy through the "Herald," to the retiring officers for their services for the year and to friends who have helped the branch in any way.

The Branch has had thirty-four members for the past year and held 19 meetings with an attendance of 880. All the Red Cross work and Soldiers comforts have been made at home. The work distributed and collected at the monthly meetings. Yarn to the value of \$104.64, was bought and knit up, 241 yds flannellette was made into Red Cross supplies. \$10. was sent to Soldiers Comforts Commission for Xmas boxes for soldiers, \$84.85 was collected and sent to the Belgian Relief. Goods sent out during the year were: Red Cross—1 Pneumonia Jacket, 81 suits pyjamas, 8 ambulance caps, 5 pillow slips, 1 surgical gown, soldiers comforts, 177 prs socks, 9 trench vests, 1 trench helmet, 10 trench caps, 6 vermin shirts, 1 day shirt, 1 pr mitts, 1 pr wristlets, 1 rain cap, 8 towels, 2 comfort bags, 1 comb, 11 candles, 18 pencils, 5 writing pads, 6 pkgs envelopes, 2 pkgs needles, 47 pkgs cigarettes, 96 pkgs gum, 14 pkgs tobacco, 28 pkgs chocolates, 1 tooth brush, 1 tube paste, 9 cakes soap, 4 tins cocoa, 8 tins oxa, 1 tin tea tablets, 8 pkgs wafers, 7 pkgs almond nuts, 7 pkgs salted peanuts, 7 pkgs candy, 7 pkgs soda biscuits, 7 pkgs shelled walnuts, 7 pkgs preserved ginger, 7 lbs loaf sugar, 7 lbs fruit cake, 7 tins butter, magazines. To returned soldiers—28 sealers of fruit and pickles. Thru the "Helping Hand" goods and clothing to the value of \$67.64, making in all a cash value sent from the branch of \$600.64.
