## County Must Pay

The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board has ordered that Halton must pay the larger share of the cost of a concrete bridge at Bronte, 20 feet wide, with a sidewalk, the Toronto and Hamilton Highway Commission to pay the balance. The county's share is figured at \$18,000, of which the Ontario Government will pay 40 per cent, under the Highway Improvement Act. The contract will be let and the work done as soon as possible.



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
