**Obituary**

**WILLIAM J. SHORTILL**

The death of Mr W. J. Shortill came as a severe shock to the whole community. Although the deceased had been ailing for some time, no fear of danger was felt by himself nor his friends. On May 16th, he was in Markdale, and we learned he was leaving for St. Joseph's hospital, Hamilton, Ont., where he was to undergo an operation for a growth in the stomach. He was full of hope. The operation was successful, and he was feeling particularly good on Monday night, when his son, Rob, spent the night in his father's ward. He spoke of his return home, and remarked that his trouble was now over, and he would be a different man. Later he wrote a letter home, quite cheerfully. But an attack of pleuro-pneumonia was contracted, and owing to his frail condition, he was unable to overcome the severe ailment, and passed away on May 24th.

The late Mr Shortill, who was in his 58th year, was born on a farm three miles from Georgetown, which farm he was interested in until the time of his death. He was married to Miss Elizabeth Near, and to them were born four children, two boys and two girls, namely: Rob and Fred, on the farm near Georgetown, Rheta, who is attending school in Markdale, and Mrs R. V. Ricketts, also of Markdale.

Decensed was highly respected in Markdale, where, he has for the past twenty years conducted a jewelry business, during which time he has continuously been Superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School. He was a member of the Masonic Order, and the A.O.U.W.

The funeral took place on Monday from his farm home at Georgetown, to Ballinacaf Cemetery, under the auspices of the Masonic Order. Rev Mr Stanley, of Markdale, and Rev Mr Smith, of Erin, officiated.

The pall bearers were:—R. Gillian, H. Duff, T. Roburn, B. Brady, I. Lucas and S. Worden.

Besides his widow and family, deceased is survived by his aged mother who lives on the old home, and one sister, Mrs Anthony, near Georgetown.

Among the floral tributes was a wreath from the Methodist Sunday School and Trustee Board, and a spray from Mrs Will Shortill and family. The profound sympathy is extended to the bereaved family.
