Obituary

CHRISTINA C. MOSSMAN
At the ripe old age of 92 years, Christina C. Mossman, relict of the late John C. Mossman, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. Finlay, on Thursday, June 19th. Deceased was born at Gaitheir, near Edinburgh, Scotland, Nov. 29th, 1825. She married John C. Mossman, who died 42 years ago, in 1867, and came to the United States 64 years ago, where she resided until 6 years ago, when she came to live with her daughter, Mrs. E. Finlay. Deceased was a member of the Presbyterian Church. She is survived by three sons, Alexander, of Lee, Mass.; Jno. C. Holyoke, Mass.; Scott A., Georgetown; and one daughter, Mrs. E. Finlay, Georgetown. Another daughter died 8 years ago. She also leaves 18 grand children, 7 great-grand children and 2 great great-grand children.

The funeral which was private, took place from the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. Finlay, Main St. North, on Friday morning, the service being conducted by Rev. R. F. Cameron. The pall-bearers were—grandsons, Richard A., Edward and Wallace Finlay, J. J. Allen, G. M. Arnold and Dr. McAndrew. The remains were interred at Holyoke, Mass.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

Communications were read from Le Roy Dale, Grand Trunk By; Deputy Minister of Finance, Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co; Sidney Kendall, Toronto.

Mr. A. Campbell addressed Council re assessment on farm land.

Mr. J. H. Lane addressed Council re opening of ditch on Main and Wesleyan Sts. This matter was laid over for a few days.

Moved by Rush, seconded by Cook, that the resignation of Le Roy Dale, as town solicitor be accepted—Carried.

Moved by Cook, seconded by Rush, that the following accounts be passed:—

On motion of Rush and Cook, a By-law was read the necessary number of times and finally passed authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow \$5000, for current expenses of the town.

Moved by Cook, seconded by Rush, that Constable Reith be instructed to have the parties who dumped ashes, etc., in the park instead of throwing it over the bank, remove same at once or take action to compel them to do so—Carried.

Council adjourned.
