### KAISER'S BIRTH CAUSED JOY

Queen Victoria, Upon Receipt of Telegrams Announcing Birth, Could Not Maintain Usual Dignity.

Anecdotes about the royal family are usually rather flat, but here is a good story of Queen Victoria, relates a correspondent, the trouble and tearful commentary on which she never could get her mind to rest.

The queen, whom we had so lately parted from in calm dignity, was flying with the eagerness of a young girl, and so rapid was her impetuous and so joyous her expression, it was plain that her suite had much difficulty in keeping pace with her speed. Catching sight of a friend in the distance, as she came up the long room, she suddenly waved aloft a telegram, and called out in triumphant tones, unheeding the shocked expression of her attendants at such unconventionalality: "Lady Logan! Lady Logan! I am a grandmother!"

Such was the welcome given to the English queen's first grandchild—Kaiser Wilhelm II.

### A Race of Cripples.

The military medical authorities have examined our citizens by the thousands. The results of this examination in many instances, writes Bernard Macfadden, in Physical Culture, have been as follows:

Out of every five examined, one is considered sound. The other four are cripples. Some part of their internal organisms is affected. The heart, stomach, lungs, kidneys or some other vital organ or function is crippled.

For generations the blind have been leading the blind. The physical body is of no special importance. The house in which we live needs no special attention. It "just grows." No matter how dirty it may be. So long as the dirt does not show on the surface, there is no occasion for complaint or criticism. That has been our attitude.

### Can't Lose Glasses.

Military eyeglasses is the contribution to the field of war inventions by Dr. Robert J. James, well-known Seattle physician and surgeon.

The outstanding features of the new eyeglasses, according to the inventor, are: They cannot be jarred loose from their places even under the most severe treatment, the tightening hold on the nose, which is injurious to one's health and comfort, is eliminated and gives way to three natural points of suspension, and the glasses may be removed with one hand.

The glasses have two extensions at either side of the face slightly above the eye. The small plate at the end of the extensions holds the glasses firm and does not rest on any vital nerve or blood vessel, as is the case when the only point of suspension is at the nose.

### Espionage Law.

The correct and official title of the so-called espionage act is "an act to punish acts of interference with the foreign relations, the neutrality and the foreign commerce of the United States, to punish espionage, and better to enforce criminal laws of the United States, and for other purposes." It says: "Every letter, writing, circular, postal card, picture, print, engraving, photograph, newspaper, pamphlet, book or other publication, matter or thing, of any kind, containing any matter advocating or urging insurrection or forcible resistance to any law of the United States, is hereby declared to be scoundrelous," and any person attempting to use the mails for the transmission of any of the prohibited matter shall be fined not more than \$5,000 or imprisoned not more than five years, or both.
