So, then, whon we marshal our forces we find that a man needs in a day 12 ounces of une or of a combination. of the following: Ment, poultry, cheese, tirled vegetables, fish or eggs. To vary the above he may count every glass of milk drunk equal to an ounce of any one of the others.

The soldiers, either in home or military life, must have four pounds of fresh fruit and vegetables in order to keep the bony structure in good condition. He will need the three-quarters of a cupful of fat (this includes butter, oil, the fut of ment eaten, or any other fat in the daily diet) to keep him warm, and to this group he must add one and one-fourth pounds of brend or cereal; and finally, in order to complete the necessary amount of driving-power, he must have two ounces of sugar or one-third of a cupful of sirup.

DEPORTING A WHOLE NATION


