Some one hundred and twenty five representatives from all parts of the county were present. The District Pre, Mrs. Gounan, took the chair and the meeting was opened by the members singing the doxelogy...

In her short address, the President urged on the members the necessity of continuing and ever increasing their patriotic work, and reminded them of the duty of registering on June 22. Every female over sixteen years must register.

There are thirteen branches of the W.I. in the county, and one Girls' Branch. Besides other activities the Girls' Branch packed 100 boxes for soldiers overseas.

There has been 188 meetings with an attendance of 4885.

In her report of the patriotic work, Mrs Havill stated that during the last Institute year, 1647 pairs of socks have been sent from the W.I., and the sum of \$5618 has been spent on patriotic work. As the W.I. is under Gov't control it is exempt from the War Charity Act, consequently all patriotic work has to be reported every six months.

All the branches reported progress, none seemed to be growing weary of war work, although many Institute members also belong to other patriotic societies.

Several Institutes have been given substantial grants form their local councils, One branch was donated a calf, by some well disposed friend, and the said calf afterwards netted them \$20. At least two of the branches send their socks directly to the men in the trenches. Esquesing branch has a member nursing overseas.

One branch gives concerts every three weeks to raise money for their patriotic fund and they send ten boxes monthly, overseas to lo-

Another branch reported that

they looked after twenty-seven friendless soldiers. Another branch sent 14 quilts to

the sufferers at Halifax. Mrs Havill, Acton, who has been secretary for the W.I. for the past ten years, urged the importance

of conducting all the Institute work on a businesslike method. In recognition of the fact that the Sec'y has had her duties considerably increased by the patriotic work, Mrs Havill was presented by

the district with a small cash gift. The question of Medical Inspec. tion in the Public Schools was introduced by the President and the meeting decided in favour of it. Four schools in Trafalgar have applied for medical inspection, Oakville and Burlington already have it. All honour to them.

In view of the fact that Milton is the county town and centrally located, it was decided to hold the annual meeting there next year.

The members of the board of Agriculture joined the W.I. in a picnic tea, which gave the members an opportunity for social intercourses and was greatly enjoyed by


