General News

NATURALIA.
Much damage was done to the fruit orchards of the province by the severe winter.

The Social Service Commission is urging the Provincial Government to adopt pensions for mothers.

The Provincial Board of Health will demand preventive measures to protect the growing of babies.

The United States Federal Trade Commission will reopen the case against the Government's not hurry up with the bonus voted by Parliament.

Wesley Martin of the Six Nations Reserve was fined \$100 for not having a registration card; it is a text case.

The Attorney-General's Department notified the Solicitor for Toronto that no action could be taken on the ferry by-law until it has been revised by the city.

MONDAY.
Caley W. Cannel, 29 years old, was found suspended by a rope in his brother's barn at East Zorra.

Cadet J. F. Buchanan and J. C. White, R. A. F., collided in the air near Picton and both were killed.

Many men in various parts of the province are making application for writs of habeas corpus to avoid military service.

Darius estimated at \$125,000 was done by a fire which destroyed the Sanderson Percy & Co., Ltd., building in Toronto.

Water was turned on in York township, half a million dollars having been invested, and thirty thousand people benefiting.

Judge Coatsworth was chosen by the city and civic employes representatives of the Board of Arbitration, as the fifth member and chairman of the board.

The Toronto Jury Inquiring into the death of the three Mimico boys who lost their lives on the lake found that the life-saving equipment should be improved.

Two men were killed when the third floor in a munitions building in Montreal collapsed under the weight of shells and crashed through to the cellar.

Five men in Montreal were instantly killed, being buried to a depth of a live power wire falling upon them when broken by a derrick swinging against it.

A memorial service for the medical officers and nursing sisters who went down on the Canadian hospital ship, Llandovery Castle, was held in New St. Andrew's church.

The Railway War Board has told the shipper that it cannot go beyond the offer of the "Medco" award, which they have refused, and a strike is imminent on Tuesday.

TUESDAY.
The sum of \$15,593 was collected by the French Flag Day workers in Toronto.

At least 48 additional writs of habeas corpus were applied for at Quebec and 27 at Ottawa.

Over 84,000 people in the Central Ontario district signified their willingness to do farm work.

Pembroke had a bad conflagration, the second within a month, the damage amounting to \$300,000.

Lt. C. J. Humphrey's airplane fell into Long Point Bay and was drowned.

Mr. R. C. Harris, Fuel Controller for Ontario, admits coal scarce, but claims there is no famine.

Maj.-Gen. W. C. Langfield has been appointed Chief Engineer of the American Expeditionary Forces.

Ten apple barrels containing much whiskey were discovered in a carload of hay at North Toronto station.

Justice Coatsworth has accepted the position of chairman of the Board of Arbitrators investigating the recent civic strike.

A Canadian section has been formed at the British General Headquarters in France to afford Canada more complete control over her forces overseas.

Several hundred persons are dying daily in Petrograd from cholera, according to a Stockholm report. The disease is prevalent in many parts of Russia.

Ten thousand persons in San Juan, Porto Rico, have been hit by a typhoid fever during the past two weeks. In some instances business houses have had to close.

The lower House of the Hungarian Diet has adopted the franchise bill, the party of Count Karolyi and some supporters have withdrawn, and the reform voting against the measure.

The Border Cities Real Estate Board will seek the Dominion Government's backing for an issue of \$1,500,000 debentures by the municipalities for the immediate erection of 1,400 houses for workmen.

Contracts for thirty additional steel cargo ships have been let by the Shipping Board to Japanese yards. Contracts also have been let for building 20 transport to the Boholom Shipbuilding Corporation at Alameda, Cal.

Life of Man With Respect to Calls.
