The county council met at Milton on Tuesday, July 30th.
Communications were read as follows: From the Deputy Minister of Education stating amounts of high school grants, Oakville \$702.61, Georgetown \$771.45, from the Secretary of the Y.M.C.A., acknowledging receipt of \$3,000 on account of grant; also certificate of approval by the Minister of Finance of issue of debentures to the amount of \$14,000 for frontage bridge; also claim of Streetsville high school for maintenance of Halton pupils 1916.
A by-law for the purpose of raising money to meet the expenses of the county for the current financial year was introduced and read, the usual number of times and passed.
A by-law for the purpose of sinking a special loan in those municipalities participating in the money received, under the road works by-law No. 428, was introduced and read, the usual number of times and passed.
A number of reports from various standing committees were read and considered by the committee of the whole afterwards adopted by the council.
A deputation from the Children's Aid Society, consisting of Sheriff Webster, Miss Hudly and G. P. Stuart, addressed the council.
Mr. Hynds presented and read the sixth report of the finance committee.
Report adopted and council adjourned to meet at the call of the Warden.

A vote was attempted to be taken on the location of the Children's Home, but for some reason or other nothing came of it on account of the actions of some members of the council who were very reluctant to show where they stood in the matter.
