Obituary

DR. J. R. NIXON
 After an illness of a week Dr. J. R. Nixon passed away on Friday morning last, in his 47th year. Dr. Nixon was a son of Mr. James Nixon and was born on his father's farm at Ashgrove. He received his early education at Ashgrove public school, then attended Georgetown High School where he graduated. After teaching school for a short time he studied medicine at Toronto University where he proved himself a clever student passing his examinations with honours. After practising his profession at Malvern for a time he came to Georgetown some 13 years ago where he has since been associated with his cousin, Dr. A. W. Nixon, M.P. Some few weeks ago he returned from New York after taking a post graduate course. Deceased was one of our most popular young men, widely known in his practice and enjoyed the esteem of the entire community. He took a deep interest in town affairs, had served in the Council and was always ready to assist in anything for the betterment of his home community. He was Medical Health officer for Esquimaux and also Coroner. He was a Past Master of Credit Lodge A.F. & A.M. and an adherent of the Methodist Church. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from the home of his father, Mr. James H. Nixon, Ashgrove, to Greenwood Cemetery Georgetown, and was largely attended. The service was conducted by Rev. J. Traux, Rev. E. Cameron and members of the Masonic Order, representatives of which were present from Milton, Brampton and Acton.

Besides his father the other members of his family living are: Mrs. Smith, Gladstone, Man.; Mr. Nixon, Milton; Mrs. (Rev.) Griffin Thompson, Hamilton; Fred Nixon, Middleton, Conn.; E. H. Nixon, Toronto; Will and Miss Dell at home.
