Turkey Has "Jeke" Sultan

It is sufficient for most persons to know that the Sultan of Turkey is the Sultane Porte, but not so with F. Gulliford Owen, who explains to the readers of the New York Sun that the latest and present, and maybe the last, Sultan is probably Burhan Eddie Effendi, who has been proclaimed under the name of Mohammed VI. For military purposes it is not important to know anything about the Sultan, since he, like the German Minister, is the creature of the Kaiser, but it is interesting to note that the new Sultan whom we shall call Eddie for short, is the son of the late Sultan, who was a man of great ability, though not popular. This new Sultan is singularly like his father, Abdul Hamid, which is an unfortunate distinction. In fact, Eddie is the son of the same family, but although he is supposed to have been the favorite of his father, he stood far below in the list of popularity, and was even called "the black sheep." This fact, it is believed, helped him to the position of Sultan, as the method employed by the Germans in their war against Russia, spread no doubt, in their miseries to Germany.

The Sultan's government is the successor of the Ottoman Empire, which was founded by the reigning Sultan, Murad I, outside of Constantinople, and Eddie's son, the late Sultan, died with him.

Then his eldest brother put

him in a wooden chest and took him to the capital, where he was buried.

His son is called upon to go over the top, really backed by a crowd of expert soup-busters. This procedure is not varied, for the final authority with regard to the succession to the throne is reposed in two officials, namely, the Sheik-ul-Islam, head of the Muslim Church, and the Patriarch of the Greek Orthodox Church, who can be deposed by the Sultan; the latter appears to have permanent tenure of office and to be independent of the former, as regards the Sultan. In fact, if Mr. Owen had not mentioned him his very existence would have been unnoticed. It was fate that the Patriarch, for whom the former Petka died and another was to be appointed or elected, German influence made itself felt and the present Petka is said to owe his position to the Germans.

According to present the present Sultan of Turkey ought to have been Youssouf-Izzedin, nephew of the Sultan, but he was deposed, the Young Turk movement and applauded the dethronement of Abdul, by whom he had been kept in captivity. This is the fact that the German party is so easily and readily won to the course upon which Enver Bey was embarking.

His country was a disastrous one, was sufficient to disqualify him, and he was sent to a prison camp, where he committed suicide.

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
