Big Peace Celebrations at Georgetown and Glenwilliams

Mills, Factories, Schools, and Business Places Closed for Afternoon
Thank God for Great Victory

When the news was received in town on Thursday last, about 1 p.m. that the armistice had been signed by the German representatives and that the War was practically over, everybody prepared to celebrate.

Our Mills, factories, Schools and business places were closed, flags and bunting were profusely displayed, bells rang and whistles blew. A band composed of Glenwilliams and Georgetown musicians, under the leadership of Mr. A. B. Cassill, opened the proceedings at the Public School square by playing the national anthem. A monster procession was then formed, led by Reeve Heartwell, Major Grant and the band, and proceeded down Main St. to the Public Library lawn. After announcing the news of victory from the band stand, Reeve Heartwell called on Rev. Mr. Cameron who led in prayer, thanking Almighty God for the great victory. Speeches followed by Major Grant, Ex-Warden L. E. Fleck, Major Gardiner and Councillor T. J. Speight.

The band then played "Abide with Me," while the large gathering stood with bared heads. Three cheers and a tiger for the King and Allies was followed by selections by the band, much flag waving and blowing of trumpets.

TO GLENWILLIAMS
At the corner of Main and Mill Streets the procession was reformed and proceeded to Glenwilliams by auto where another celebration was held. Speeches were made by Major Grant and Mr. George Beaumont. Several selections were rendered by the band followed by cheers for the King and Allies.

Although this celebration now appears to have been a little premature, as later reports proved the news to be false, no one was sorry for the action taken. The good news of the past week was sufficient cause for rejoicing and giving thanks to the Almighty for the assurance of a speedy termination of the awful bloodshed, and the triumph of right over might.

Monday was another day of rejoicing in town. The official report that Germany had accepted the terms of the Allies was received at 8.30 a.m., almost immediately the bells and whistles were brought into action again and a large bon fire built on Main St. Citizens tumbled out of bed to the glad news and join in the rejoicing when you can afford to buy bonds for twice or twenty times that amount.

The following letter was received by Mr. A. G. Green in regard to his son, Pte. Ivan T. Green, who died on October 21st.

Bovington Camp
Wareham, Dorset
October 24th, 1918.

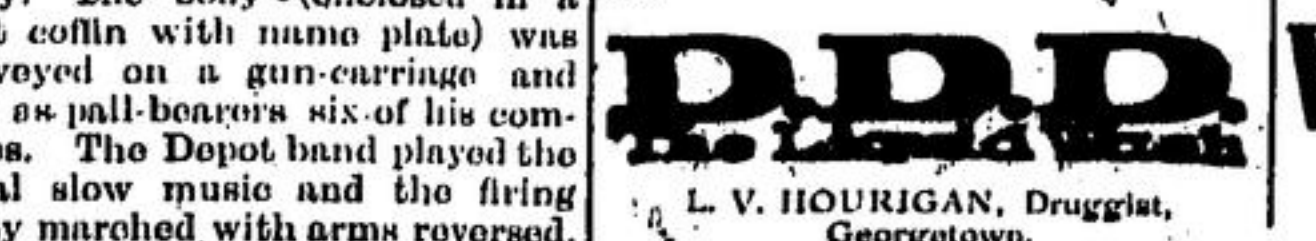
Dear Mr. and Mrs. Green:
You have had long before this a cablegram informing you of the death of your son, Pte. Ivan Terrence Green. He died about 7 o'clock on Monday morning, the 21st of October. I had been in to see him frequently while he was ill and had little talks with him and when his condition became serious we read a few words of Christ and of God to him together. He knew his illness was dangerous but was not afraid of death. On Sunday evening late I called in at the hospital and found him very weak. I then asked him if he had any word to send to you, that I intended to write you next day. He said to send you "his best love and if he didn't get better not to mourn too much for him." I asked him if there was any particular request he wanted to make and he said "No, just to send his love." We repeated the Lord's Prayer together and I offered a short prayer for him and for you. The first word I got in the morning was that he had passed away. I thought he would have lived another day but it seems he had grown very weak. He was quite conscious up to almost the last, as the nurse told me.

You will be glad to know that he received every attention that skill and kindness could suggest. He had a private ward and the nurses were unremitting in their efforts to save him. The medical officer too did all he could for him. The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon. At 1:30 the engine left the hospital at the camp proceeding to the Churchyard at Wool, about a mile and a half away. The body (enclosed in a neat coffin with name plate) was conveyed on a gun-carriage and had six pall-bearers six of his comrades. The Depot band played the usual slow music and the firing party marched with arms reversed.
