### Big Peace Celebrations at Georgetown and Glenwilliams

Mills, Factories, Schools, and Business Places Closed for Afternoon

#### Thank God for Great Victory

When the news was received in town on Thursday last, about 1 p.m., that the armistice had been signed by the German representatives and that the War was practically over, everybody prepared to celebrate.

Our Mills, factories, Schools and business places were closed, flags and bunting were profusely displayed, bells rang and whistles blew. A band composed of Glenwilliams and Georgetown musicians, under the leadership of Mr. A. B. Castell, opened the proceedings at the Public School square by playing the national anthem. A monster procession was then formed, led by Reeve Heartwell, Major Grant and the band, and marched down Main St. to the Public Library lawn. At 4 p.m. the band struck up "Victory" from the band stand. Reeve Heartwell called on Rev. Mr. Cuthbert who led in prayer thanking Almighty God for the great victory. Wreath Speeches followed by Major Grant, Ex-Warden L. E. Fleck, Major Gardner and Councillor T. J. Speight.

The band then played "Abide with me," while the large gathering stood with bared heads. Three cheers and a tiger for the King and Allies was followed by selections by the band, much flag waving and blowing of trumpets.

To GLENWILLIAMS

At the corner of Main and Mill Streets the procession was reformed and proceeded to Glenwilliams by auto where another celebration was held. Speeches were made by Major Grant and Mr. George Beaumont. Several selections were rendered by the band followed by cheers for the King and Allies.

Although this celebration now appears to have been a little premature, as later reports proved the news to be false, no one was sorry to have it taken. The good news of the past week was sufficient cause for rejoicing and giving thanks to the Almighty for the assurance of a speedy termination of the awful bloodshed, and the triumph of right over might.
