Obituary

T. H. JAMES
The death occurred on November 18th, at 10:30 at the family residence, 12 John St., of Mr. Thomas Hudson James, one of the city's best known residents. Death was not unexpected as Mr. James had been ailing for the past six months, but it was not until Sunday he was confined to his bed. The end came peacefully last night.

The late Mr. James was in his 68th year and was born in Glen Williams, from which place he came to Galt 27 years ago to accept a position with the Goldie and McCulloch Co. He was an expert mechanic and for 25 years had been one of the most trusted and faithful employees of this well known firm. The greater part of the 25 years he had been an employee of the Goldie and McCulloch Co. was spent on the road installing engine plants, and his faithfulness to his employers was an outstanding feature of his long service. In his work of installing engine plants he had travelled all over the Dominion. Following the outbreak of the war he was employed on guard duty on Galt St. at the south works of the company and it was while on this work that he contracted a cold which brought about his illness.

Deceased was exceptionally well known and was held in high esteem by all his acquaintances. In religion he was a Presbyterian, a member of Knox Church.

Besides his widow there survives a family of five sons and one daughter, Thomas Herbert, Galt; George M., Principal of Deseronto High School; Colin G., London, electrician of the Hydro electric Power Commission; Frank G., Hamilton, foreman of the Otis-Fenson Elevator Co.; and Bert B., of Galt; and Mrs. Richard Lunn of Waterloo, late of Galt, and also one brother and one sister, George of Richardson St. and Mrs. Margaret Forster of Rochester.

The funeral took place from his late residence, 12 John St. Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock to Mount View cemetery.—Galt Reporter.

ROBERT STEAD'S NEW NOVEL

Robert J. C. Stead, in his new novel, "The Cow Puncher," (Toronto, the Munson Book Co., Ltd., cloth, \$1.50), has written a notable book with a Western Canada setting. David Elden, the cow puncher of the story, grows to young man-hood on a ranch in the foothills, outside the influence of church or school. At eighteen he is accidentally thrown into the company of a young Eastern girl, who enthralls in him the ambition to be somebody in the world. With this purpose in view, young Elden leaves the ranch and goes to make his fortune in a young Western city. The first night he is swindled out of all his ready cash by a gang of card-sharppers, and he takes a job next morning as a coal hauler. For a time it looks as though Dave's course would be downward instead of up, but he, fortunately comes under influences which revive his ambition for self-betterment.

About this time the big western real estate boom breaks out, and Dave's course is meteoric. His wealth comes quickly and goes as quickly. Following the collapse of the boom a tragedy in his love affair sends him as an enlisted man to France. In the closing chapters is found one of the highest patriotic notes struck by any author during the war.

"The Cow Puncher" is decidedly worth while. It is interesting and refreshing, and at times inspiring, written with all Mr. Stead's intimate knowledge of the West and skill of delineation. Though the book runs a happy vein of humor and philosophy which is not the least of its charms. It is illustrated by Arthur Fleming, ex-lumber man and North-West Mounted policeman, and is announced by the publishers as an all-Canadian book—written by a Canadian, illustrated by a Canadian, and printed and bound in Canada. It should receive a warm welcome from the Canadian reading public. The United States edition is by Harpers.
