**WILLIAM SMITH**  
 A man well known and respected in the County of Peel, passed away last Thursday morning in the person of William Smith. He had been in failing health for a number of years, but until a few weeks ago was not confined to the house. Born in the township of Chinguacousy, he spent the greater part of his life here, giving up farming about thirty years ago, he came to Brampton, where he has since resided. He is survived by his widow, but leaves no children. The deceased is the last of a large family of men prominent in the County of Peel, the late John Smith, ex-M.P.P., being the most widely known. He was 88 years of age, and was for many years a member of the Protestant Episcopal Church and a supporter of the liberal party.
