HERE'S TO THE OLD and here's to the new village Council of Georgetown. The members of the old Board and Councilors we extend thanks for services rendered, and to the new Reeve and Councilors we express the hope that they will realize all that is expected of them.

THE PRIZE Conference delegates have at last been named and the Dominion's Premier has been honored by being invited to sit at all sessions at which Canadian matters will be discussed. Canada will look to Sir Robert to put in a claim for every expense before his name has been put to account of the war.
