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**Salvation Army Has Independent Audit of Books**

In Financial Operations Carried On In Modern Way—Public Invited to Inspect

The thirty-sixth Annual Financial Statement of the Salvation Army for Canada East, Newfoundland, and Bermuda, for the past year, has just been issued from the office of Commissioner Richards.

Some of the chief institutions supported by the Army's funds are: Thirteen Rescues and Children's Homes and Hospitals from London to Halifax; Men's Hostels at London, Hamilton, Quebec, St. John, N.B., St. John's, Nfld., Toronto, Montreal, and Halifax; Training Colleges for Young People, Work, Prison Gates, Work, Salvages, and many other branches of the Army's activities which call for considerable outlays of money.

The books of the Salvation Army are audited by independent auditors and are on file and open for the inspection of the public. The business of the Army is conducted on modern principles just as any large commercial or financial institution is conducted. Every account is kept separately, and the financial management is in the hands of Lieut. Colonel A. E. Smeeton, who is a chartered accountant of ripe experience.

In a letter written recently to his father, Mr. James Hood, of Stewarttown, Pte. J. D. Hood, states that he arrived in France only a few days before the armistice was signed, and that he is well.

**Automatic Parcel Lockers Installed By Grand Trunk**

\*Cast Iron Men Will Now Receive and Check Your Bag at Local Station\*  
The Grand Trunk has installed in the waiting room of Georgetown station, a system of automatic parcel checking for the convenience of the travelling public. This innovation consists of a series of slot lockers, each large enough to hold two thirty inch suit cases, a number of parcels or a club bag. Instructions as to operation are printed plainly on the door of every locker.  
The patron selects a locker where the key is in the lock, opens the door and deposits his bag or other property. The patron then places ten cents in the slot of the locker, turning the key to the right, which locks the door, and then removes the key and retains it as a check. The number of each key corresponds with the number of a locker. The traveller on returning to the station to obtain his property inserts the key in the lock, and turns it to the left, unlocking the door. The key is automatically fastened in the lock and cannot again be removed until another coin is deposited. The checking service given for the one payment covers a period of twenty-four hours or less.  
These automatic lockers are being used extensively on the Grand Trunk System. They have proved safe and sanitary, permitting the patron to obtain service with the least possible delay. The railway in installing them has felt that they will be appreciated by travellers using the line.
