Seed Importation Regulations.

Canadian farmers and gardeners are protected from the evils of planting inferior seed of many kinds of crops imported from other countries. By an order-in-council that came into effect in the autumn, importation is prohibited of units of seed of clovers, grasses, vetches, rape, other forage plants, field root and garden vegetables in lots of ten pounds or more.

In Pamphlet 8-12 of the Seed Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, and obtainable from the Publications Branch, unit seed is described as that which does not comply with the Seed Control Act requirements regarding the sale of seed in Canada, or if it has been refused admittance into any other country on account of low vitality.

The regulations will be carried out through the Customs officials who are required to take and forward to the Dominion Seed Laboratory for examination, sample of 'lots of seeds of the classes named, intended for importation in Canada. Seed that has arrived in Canada and found to be unfit shall be deported under Customs supervision.

'Canadian National Railway' with Headquarters in Toronto

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 30.—A circular issued by President Hannu announces that, effective Jan. 1st, all government railway lines here before known as Canadian Northern, including its eastern and western lines, and Canadian Government Railways, composing the National Transcontinental, Intercolonial, Prince Edward Island, will be known and operated under the name "Canadian National Railway," headquarters of which will be in Toronto.

All officers are requested to use this name and it is desirable that the public and railway connections adopt at once this new title in their business relations with the Canadian National Railway.
