Canadian farmers and gardeners are protected from the evils of planting inferior seed of many kinds of crops imported from other countries. By an order-in-council that came into effect in the autumn, importation is prohibited of unfi seed of clovers: grasses, vetches rape, other forage plants, field root and garden vegetables in lots of

ten pounds or more.


