Halton Schools

According to the P.S. Inspector's
Report for 1918, there were 110
teachers in Halton public schools
during that year, as follows: Es-
quimaux 20, Nasagawayo 10, Nel-
son 14, Trafalgar 18, Acton 9, Bur-
lington 12, Georgetown 7, Milton
10, and Oakville 16. These in-
clude the continuation schools.
The highest salary paid in the
county was \$1700, the lowest \$550,
for engineering the highest salary
paid was \$850, the lowest \$800.
In Nasagawayo the highest was
\$700, the lowest \$550.
In Nelson the highest was \$600,
the lowest \$600.
In Trafalgar the highest was
\$740, the lowest \$590.
In the following towns and vil-
lages, Principals, and continuation
school teachers are not included:
Acton, highest salary, \$800; low-
est \$550.
Burlington, highest, \$800; low-
est \$550.
Georgetown, highest, \$760; low-
est \$560.
Milton, highest, \$700; lowest
\$600.
Oakville, highest, \$700; lowest,
\$600.
The payroll was as follows:
Acton \$80, Burlington \$75, Geo-
rgetown \$88, Milton \$88, Oakville \$18.

The Best Varieties of Grain

For many years the Dominion
Experimental Farms and Stations
have been conducting tests in the
various provinces to determine the
best varieties of cereal crops for
cultivation in Canada. In Circular
No. 16 issued by the Cereal Divi-
sion, and distributed by the Publi-
cations Branch of the Department
of Agriculture at Ottawa, the re-
sults of the leading varieties are dis-
cussed and such information given
as will be a guide to farmers in se-
lecting the varieties to sow this
Spring. After a general discussion
of the varieties the best kinds are
arranged approximately in the or-
der of merit for the different parts
of Canada. Wheats are divided
into six classes. Following are the
leading varieties in each class: Fall
spring wheat, lake ripening, Red
Fife; early ripening, Marquis; very
early, Ruby; extremely early, Pre-
lude Durum, Kibanka. These
several early sorts are recommend-
ed for northern areas. In oats the
Banner is placed first; six-rowed
barley, Manchurian; two-row bar-
ley, Mackillop; hooded barley, Sun-
cross and Champion; hullless, Guy
Mayer; Emmer and Spelt, common
emmer is named as the best sort.
Arthur is placed at the head of
varieties of peas. Navy, a pure
white bean of medium size is high-
ly recommended and Novelty is
the name of the best fax for seed
while Longstem is considered best
for fibre. Eye buckwheat is the
best sort so far decided.
