

That Remarkable Sheep. Some of the most singular plants the world are the vegetable sheep of New Zealand. These are known to science as raoulia eximia, and although they are of such a strange habit of growth they are members of the daisy tribe. The vegetable sheep grow at high altitudes, usually on some bleak mountain slope, which may be 5,000 feet above sea level. 'The whole plant is a compact mass of stems densely covered with small wooly enves. So closely do the reculias resemble sheep that experienced shepherds will often climb a long way up the mountain, thinking that they see some missing member of their flock huddled against a rock, only to discover that they have been deceived by plant!
