### Halton Deanery Meeting

A meeting of the Deanery of Halton was held in the parish of Burlington, on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. On the evening of the 19th, Divine Service was held in St. Luke's Church, the clergy of the Deanery officiating and Ven. Archdeacon Mackintosh being the special preacher for the occasion.

At 9 a.m. Wednesday, Holy Communion was celebrated, the Rural Dean being the celebrant assisted by Rev. G. W. Tebbs. Rev. Canon Woodcock gave a devotional address based on 1 Cor. 13.

The Chapter meeting was held in the Rectory at 10 o'clock when business pertaining to the church's welfare in the Deanery was considered. Sympathetic reference was made to the loss which the Deanery has sustained in the death of Rev. F. W. Hovey. The departure of Rev. Dr. Smith from the Diocese was much regretted, constituting as it does a distinct loss, and it was felt that the Deanery was much the poorer because of his departure.

A Round Table Conference conducted by Rev. Ralph S. Mason on "Rural S.S. Problems," was held in the School-house at 11 a.m. During this Session Miss Pettigrew, of Norval, handed in her resignation as Deanery Treasurer, and Miss Chisholm, of Oakville, as Secretary. These were accepted with a great deal of regret, and Rev. Mr. Lowe, of Lowville, was elected to the dual office.

Luncheon was served by the ladies of St. Luke's after which the W.A. went into session. Miss Peirce, of Georgetown, Deanery Secretary, pondered her report and most interesting addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Earp, of Kangra, India, and Mrs. Stringer, of the Yukon.

The whole Conference, though an exceedingly busy one, was extremely interesting, the kind hospitality of the Burlington people adding not a little to the enjoyment. It is proposed to meet in the parish of Lowville next June, when the Deanery Association of the W.A. will pack their bale.

Mr. McEachern was removing the old tire and in his efforts to remove one nut which was very tight, the wrench slipped off, giving his body such a jerk that it caused a rupture of the heart, resulting in his death a few hours later in the General Hospital, Toronto.
