How the Town Council stands on the Matter

The G.W.V.A. appreciates very much the kindly feeling shown toward them by the Council. The G.W.V.A. project has its support, and individually and collectively it has given the G.W.V.A. every consideration, and the Association feels that the Council in passing the following resolution, helped considerably to insure the success of the campaign next week:

"Moved by LeRoy Dale, seconded by W. F. Bradley, that this Council, owing to the legal and financial aspects of the situation, feel that they cannot respond to the wishes of the Committee to raise \$2,000 to procure watches for the returned soldiers by direct taxation. This Council also feels that any gift or subscription given by the people should be of their own free will and volition. This Council also feels that the subscriptions for the watches and memorial should be raised separate and distinct from the club house, and feel that they do not in any way want to interfere with the purchase of a club house by the G.W.V.A., and would recommend to the Committee, that if the G.W.V.A. feel there is an urgent necessity for collecting for their club house, that the Committee defer raising the money by public subscription for the watches to be given to the returned soldiers and for a memorial to be ereqted in honor of those who have fallen, until such further time as they may deem expedient.
