The Club House
I wish to put myself on record in protest against the so-called Club-house for the use of the returned soldiers.

In making this protest, which I do of my own volition, I firmly believe that no institution could be established that would militate so strongly against the best interests of the community, the nation and the returning men themselves, and their absorption to civil life.

These men need homes and home life, not club life; the majority will prefer and select home life, and so would all were it not for stumbling blocks thrown in their way by a grateful but ill advised public.

While the G.W.V.A. should meet periodically like any other fraternality, they need not be regarded as a thing apart to be fed at intervals on the vapor of election-time oratory and bombast.

The United States erected club houses and soldiers' homes and similar institutions following the Civil War in '66, and invested her soldiers with a mantle of silly sentiment which in a few short months was torn to tatters, leaving an army of three and a half million men full of regrets that they had ever seen such institutions.

In 1886 the Halton volunteers returned from service and immediately went back to their homes and to the activities of citizenship. I saw a party of these men nine or ten years ago, and without exception every one was a successful man and a credit to the community.

Georgetown has in her hands the power to make or break her returning-soldiers. Which will it be?
