Spring Cleaning
 FEW THINGS give more pleasure and satisfaction than to see a beautiful town, or to spend on the home place, but whoever raises fine trees, shrubs and flowers, gives pleasure to all his townspeople. Practically every person can help maintain that order which is the foundation of beauty. To secure a town of this kind it requires constant effort and vigilance. The general run of people are careless, and some claim to be too busy to spend any time in developing and beautifying the home place. If a few people on the street are indifferent about maintaining order, the bad example infects the whole neighborhood. Consequently there needs to be a persistent campaign to create higher standards of care for the exterior of homes and public places. The desire should be cultivated for such improvements as will beautify the community and all its dwellings. Higher standards of care are more necessary than formerly to a community to acquire a reputation for an attractive appearance. A stream of automobile visitors come through our town from early spring to winter, and if the people of the community are slow to clean up their grounds and remove their rubbish, if there is a general condition of neglect, no one of these visitors will have much to say in favor of the place. But if the spring clean up work is thoroughly done, if there is a general appearance of neatness and care, the word will be passed in every town and city within hundreds of miles that Georgetown is one of the best looking places in the province. If the people are active in planting trees and shrubbery, working to beautify their homes and streets, that fact will make an impression on a wide area of country. The word will go around that in a few years Georgetown will be one of the finest residential centres in the country, from the way the people are taking hold to make improvements during this reconstruction period.

Ballantine, which was intended to create opposition to this Association having a meeting place, on the grounds that the said meeting place would interfere with the home life of the members and would interfere with their return to civilian occupation, and this Association holds the opinion that this Association from one whose record with regard to his getting back to regular civilian occupation after the four years does not compare at all favorably with the record of any member of this Association after his discharge from the Great War, hereby sent it; and whereas the writer made the statement 'While the G.W.V.A. should meet periodically like any other fraternal body, it should not be regarded as a thing apart to be fed at intervals with the vapors of election time talk and bombast' and this Association feeling that the only possible meaning of the above statement is that any citizen who renders us any aid do so with the object of using the voters of this Association for their own personal gain at some future date, regards this statement as a malicious slander and in full, not only to the members of the Association but also to the patriotic citizens who may feel inclined to assist us.—Com

Haltion Pioneer Dead

Dr. Anson Buck, of Palermo, Had Patriotic Career
 Dr. Anson Buck, M.R.C.S., the grand old man of Halton County and one of the most notable figures in the rural portion of Central Ontario, passed away at his home at Palermo on Good Friday at sundown. The career of Dr. Buck was both interesting and colorful. He had the distinction of practicing medicine for about one year and six months prior to attaining the age of 21 years, and was also married before reaching his majority.

After having attended the Grammar School at Palermo, his education was continued at the Ontario College of Medicine, and was the last living graduate of his year from that institution. For the past eleven years, Dr. Buck was an invalid, an attack of paralysis in 1908 compelling him to withdraw from the sphere of his former activities.
