NOTICE is hereby given that all residents of the Township of Esquesing are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig sty, water closets, and other outbuildings and premises, and remove all dirt, filth, manure, or other substances which may endanger public health, and to have the same completed by the 15th of May next, on which day the Sanitary Inspector will commence a general inspection. All residents are especially requested to keep their premises constantly clean and to thoroughly disinfect them. NOTE—No pig sty is to be erected within 50 feet of any dwelling house, road, street or lane.

The Public Health
Citizens are Requested to Comply With the Public Health Act
NOTICE is hereby given that all residents of Georgetown are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig sty, manure, and remove therefrom all dirt, manure and other substance which may endanger the public health and to have the same completed by the 15th day of May next, on which day the Sanitary Inspector will commence general inspection, and further take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs between the fifteenth of May and the first of November, except in pens at least 70 feet from any dwelling house and 50 feet from any street or lane, with floors kept clear from any standing water and regularly cleaned, will be strictly enforced. All citizens are earnestly requested to keep their premises constantly clean and disinfected.
