Obituary
 WM. GRIFFIN
 Mr. William Griffin, Supt. Wellington County House of Industry, since 1884, and one of the most respected and popular officials of the entire county, died on Thursday, April 10th, 1919, in his 77th year. Deceased was born in the Township of Esquimaux and was a son of the late Michael Griffin who came of U.E. Loyalist stock and settled in Hutton about 1835. Besides his widow, who was formerly Miss Elizabeth Dook of Petrolia, he leaves to mourn his loss two daughters, Mrs. John G. Wilson and Mrs. Norman D. Kyle of Perth; also one son Mr. Marshall T. Griffin of New York City. Of a family of thirteen, eight brothers and four sisters, but one now survives, Mr. J. Y. Griffin of Vancouver B.C.

The funeral which was largely attended took place on Saturday 12th. Rev. Griffin Thompson of Hamilton, a nephew of deceased, assisted at the funeral service which was held in St. John's Church, Elora.

MRS. JOHN S. APPELBE
 Clara Wright, widow of the late John S. Appelbe, passed away at Buffalo on Sunday, April 27th. Deceased was the fourth daughter of the late Wm. Wright, one of the early settlers near Milton, and was born 38 years ago on the old homestead. She came to Georgetown with her husband in 1874 and resided here until Mr. Appelbe's death 6 years ago, since which time she has lived with her son Mr. Pierce Appelbe in Buffalo. She was a faithful member of the Methodist Church for over 30 years and was an exemplary Christian woman, a true and true friend. The funeral took place from the home of Col. W. P. Appelbe, Georgetown, this afternoon when the remains were laid to rest in Greenwood cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Trux.
