Georgetown, May 14, 1919. Council met at 7:30 with the Reeve in the chair and members all present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were read and confirmed. Communications were read from Neil Hunter, resigning as Fire Chief; W. L. Purvis, Contractor, Toronto, and from the Committee, consisting of E. McCannah, J. B. Mackenzie and L. E. Fleck, reporting on the condition of Georgetown as regards housing conditions. They recommended that the Council pass a By-law so that people in Georgetown might take advantage of the Ontario Housing Act.

It was moved by Cook, seconded by McMillan, that the resignation of Mr. Neil Hunter as Fire Chief of Georgetown be accepted.

Mr. George Harrington asked for a dividend in front of his residence.

It was moved by Cook, seconded by McMillan, that this Council request the Hydro-Electric System to supply water to the fire hydrants in front of his residence.
