

BY-LAW NO. 432

The Municipal Council of the Corpora-ion of Georgetown hereby enacts as

I The Provisions of the Ontario Housing Act 1919, shall apply to this Municipality. II The head of the Council of this Municipality for the time being and E. Mc-Cannah and L. E. Fleck are hereby appointed a Commission to be known as "The Housing Commission of the Municipality of the Village of Georgetown;" for the purpose of carrying out the Provisions of the said Act, and such Commission shall be a body Corporate.

III The said E. McCannah shall hold office for one year, and the said L. E. Fleck shall hold office for two years, and thereafter the members of the Commission other than the head of the Council shall

hold office for two years. IV Each appointed member of said Commission shall hold office until his successor is appointed.
