No More Cut-Outs

A law recently passed by the Ontario Legislature compels the removal of all cut-outs from autos and that all motor-cyclists must muffle their machines so that the people will no longer be tormented by the unearthly noise that have made life miserable for many. A Church Converted into Memorial Elora's efforts to provide a suitable memorial to her soldier sons has already come to a satisfactory outcome. Some time ago the two Presbyterian congregations united leaving Chalmers church vacant. Negotiations have been effected whereby the church property passed to the municipality. The church is to be remodeled into a community memorial hall in honor of the town's boys who took part in the Great War. The plans for the improvements are very ambitious and when carried out will provide Elora with a community building which will be unique among towns of its size in Canada.

At the O. A. C.

Dr. G. C. Creelman, president of the O.A.C., Guelph, stated that new buildings to cost close to a quarter million dollars would be erected at the O.A.C. this year. These include a new boy's dormitory, which will be erected on the campus, \$150,000; addition to MacDonald Hall, to accommodate 15 more girl students, \$25,000; new apary building, \$15,000; and a memorial hall in memory of the O.A.C. students who were killed during the war. This latter building, which will have a public lecture room and chapel, will cost about \$60,000. Between 600 and 700 O.A.C. students enlisted and of this number over 100 paid the supreme sacrifice.

BY-LAW NO. 432

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of Georgetown hereby enacts as follows:

The Provisions of the Ontario Housing Act, 1919, shall apply to the Municipality.
