ISN'T IT ABOUT TIME some move was being made by our citizens in regard to the "Big Day" and presentation to our returned Soldier Heroes? The summer is here, the harvest will soon be past and if some one don't move there won't be a darned thing done.

THERE ARE TIMES when the work of a newspaper man when he must be controlled by his sympathies for the innocent ones in the publication of news. This paper bows to the inevitable in such cases and is willing to accept the criticism of some if good is accomplished and aching hearts are saved further pain.

AT THIS TIME of the year, when the assessment roll is being made up, there are many enquiries as to what qualification must a woman have in order that her name may be placed on the Municipal voters' list. There is an impression abroad that a woman and her husband may be assessed as owners of the same property, and both have their names placed on the voters' list. This is erroneous, except in cases where the deed of the property shows that there is actual joint ownership. To be entitled to vote at Municipal elections a woman must be assessed for not less than \$800 on property which she has in her own name. In the case of income assessment, the amount must be \$400. All women who are British subjects and 21 years of age, will be entitled to vote at elections to the Legislative Assembly, but when a Parliamentary election is to take place, a special list of voters will be made up. The universal franchise, however, has nothing to do with Municipal elections, where the qualification is based on property ownership only.

Obituary
NEIL HUNTER
In the passing of Neil Hunter, Chief of our Fire Brigade and one of our most honored and respected citizens, the town loses one of its best men. Deceased was born at Cheltenham 68 years ago. He has been a resident of Georgetown for the past 30 years and with his partner, Mr. David Fraser, carried on a most successful blacksmithing and wagon manufacturing business. Twenty-two years ago he was married to Miss Elizabeth Bennett, who with a family of one son and one daughter, lived and prospered. In religion he was a Presbyterian and a member of Knox church. He served a term as town Councillor and was a member of the Public School Board for a number of years and up to the time of his death. On the death of Chief Max, in 1912, he was appointed Chief of the Fire Brigade, which office he held with credit to the town, the brigade and himself. He was beloved by his men and will be sadly missed by the members of the brigade. He was a Reformer. The late Neil Hunter was a big hearted, honorable man and his place in our town will be hard to fill. Besides his widow and family two sisters, Miss Hunter and Mrs. Armstrong, and two brothers William and Alex also survive.
The funeral on Tuesday was largely attended. The casket containing the remains was conveyed on a draped horse wagon drawn by members of the Fire Brigade under command of Deputy-Chief Robt. Erwin, and six firemen acted as pall-bearers. The service was conducted by Rev. R. F. Cameron, after which the firemen's service was read by Secretary Wm. Long. There were many beautiful floral offerings, contributed by the Fire Brigade, Town Council, Public School Board, Public School Staff, Knox Church S.S. Class, deceased's family, brothers and sisters, Mrs. Coffin, Mr. R. Bennett, Mr. and Mrs. Weston, Mr. and Mrs. D. Fraser, Mr. and Mrs. S. Kirk, James A. Bell, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Arnold, Mrs. Huxtable.

Hampshire—Elliott, hereby appoint committees of Wards 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, their agents to distribute the grants to the officers and men authorized by by-law and that the treasurer is hereby authorized and instructed to pay to M. J. Carleton Ward 1, A. L. Noble Ward 2, G. O. Brown Ward 3, J. L. Moyer Ward 4, Wm. Gowling Ward 5 and E. Y. Barracough Ward 6, representing the committees, the amount for distribution, viz: "respective" Wards—Carried.

Hampshire—Thompson, that the treasurer pay the following account Treasurer of the Municipality of Nassagaweya \$2, Esqueuing share for bridge repairs, also \$89.10 for Esqueuing share of Canada Ingot Iron Co. account for culvert total \$91.10.—Carried.

Elliott—McDowell, that the treasurer pay the following accounts, Canada Ingot Iron Co. for culverts \$270.70.—Carried.
Elliott—Hampshire, that this Council adjourn to meet again on June 9th, at 10 o'clock a.m. as Court of Revision and other business.—Carried.
