U.F.O. Candidate

The Dalton United Farmers of Ontario held their convention in the town hall Milton, on Tuesday, May 27th. There were between 300 and 400 delegates. Each polling sub-division was entitled to ten five men and five women. Some, but not all, of the women were members of the United Farm Women. Marshall Campbell, president of the Farmers' Clubs, of which there are nine in the county, was chairman. There were four nominations: John P. Ford, Jas. Waldbrook and A. G. Farrow, of Trafalgar; and W. J. L. Hampshire, of Esquimaux. The last three withdrew and Mr. Ford accepted the nomination which was made unanimous. Mr. Ford made a short speech, in which he said he had always voted Conservative in parliamentary elections, but in municipal matters he had taken an independent stand. In accepting the U.F.O. nomination he reserved his independence. He would support only such measures as he believed to be in the best interests of Ontario and Canada. Mr. Dougherty of Peel, spoke at greater length on the problems of the day, considered from the farmers' standpoint. The delegates gave every indication of earnestness, enthusiasm and confidence, probably counting on a three-cornered contest giving them their opportunity. They have a strong candidate. Mr. Ford has been a leading Conservative and prominent in municipal matters. He represented his township for a number of years in the county council as Reeve and is a former Warden of the county. He is one of the most successful of the farmers—Champion.


