FOURTY-EIGHT municipalities, in-
cluding twelve cities and twenty-
one towns, eleven villages and four
townships, have thus far passed
the necessary by-laws and come
under the Ontario Housing Act.

About 500 plans have been approved
by the director, and in many
centres houses are under construc-
tion.

Mr. E. Gill, manager, states
that loans required by the municipali-
ties which have thus far made ap-
plications to him, will aggregate
nearly \$10,000,000.

This will ex-
haust the Dominion loan of \$8,000,
000 to Ontario, and will consume
in addition, the greater part of the
\$2,000,000 set aside by the Provin-
cial Government to aid the scheme.

About twenty municipalities are
considering plans for acquiring
land and erecting houses on a large
scale. Some of them have already
purchased the land and are start-
ing operations.

\$50 Victory
Bond Holders

In 1917, 899,415 \$50 Victory
Bonds were allotted to subscribers
to the Victory Loan and, in 1918,
612,744 of the same denomination
were allotted. This shows how
important the small investor has
become to the country.

It is quite probable that during
these two years \$50 Victory Bonds
were taken by nearly 1,000,000
people in Canada. One may be
sure that very few of them ever
bought a bond before. They were
an addition to the number of in-
vestors in government securities.

The problem is to retain them
as such. War Savings Stamps
may do this, they being a Govern-
ment "Baby Bond," which may be
had on easier terms than Victory
Bonds were.

Telephone Rates Up

Following the judgement deliv-
ered in Ottawa, telephone rates
will be increased this week, accord-
ing to a statement made by C. F.
Sise, Vice-President and Manager
of the Bell Telephone Company.
The cost of all telephones under
rental will be advanced 10 per
cent, and toll rates, estimated on
a basis of mileage rates, will in-
crease about 9 per cent. The lat-
ter increase, however, is not a flat
rate, for the mileage system of
tolls will decrease some charges
and advance others. When the
quarterly statement is sent to tel-
ephone subscribers July 1st, they
will find a charge for adjustment
to cover the period from the time
when the new rates take effect (in
one week) to that date. Thereaf-
ter charges will be computed quar-
terly on the new rates.
