School Grants May Be Raised

That increased grants are likely to be given to high schools throughout the Province for the establishment and maintenance of the Agricultural branch of the curriculum was the announcement made last week by the Minister of Education, Hon. Dr. Cuddy. The Minister made this announcement after he had explained the attitude of the county councils of Halton and Ontario towards their high schools, where agriculture is being taught. The Councils of these two counties have made substantial grants to the schools of Oakville, Whitby and Port Perry, over and above the usual grants that are made because of the splendid work being done in these schools in teaching agriculture. The County Council of Halton made an additional grant to the Oakville High School of \$600. In Ontario County the council was asked to visit the high schools of Whitby and Port Perry, and after doing so made an additional grant of \$250 to each school.

"We probably will make some modification of the method of grants to schools where agriculture is taught, with a view to increasing them somewhat along the lines adopted in making grants for industrial and technical education," said Dr. Cuddy.
