THAT THERE WERE 62 secret Bolshevik Societies in Canada, and that those in Montreal had a membership of 15,000, was a statement made by Mr. Eugene N. de Schelling, Russian diplomat, during a lecture given at the Club St. Denis Montreal, under the auspices of the Alliance Francaise. For this and other reasons labor should go slow in hearkening to the pleadings of a sympathetic strike.
