In this Dominion there are 60,000 males of foreign birth, 10 years of age and over, and 200,000 females of foreign birth, 10 years of age and over. British subjects by naturalization, as stipulated in the report of the Canada Immigration Board, just issued. Of the latter number, 2,718 were persons born in some part of the British dominions (197 of them in Great Britain) who renounced their British citizenship, only to become repatriated at a later date.

CANADA occupies the enviable position of being the second country in the world in the matter of available water-power privileges. With the exception of the United States, Canada has more water-power possible of development than any other country. In water-power resources the United States is first among the nations with an estimated available horse-power of 28,100,000. Canada is second with nearly 19,000,000 horse-power, and Australia third with 4,400,000. The present per capita power developed in Canada is larger than all the other countries except Norway. Within economic transmission range of practically every important city there is practically ample to the Pacific, except those in the central western prairies, there are clustered water-power sites which will meet the popular demands for hydro electric power for generations, says the Superintendent of the Power Division, Branch of the Department of the Interior.

Mayor Earl, of Milton, gave the address of welcome to the guests in his usual good style, also referred to his deep interest in shorter work. Short addresses then followed by Warden McCaugherty, of Peel, Warden Little, of Halton, and Mrs. E. B. Graham, of Brampton. Inspector Norton spoke a few words. Then followed the presentation of the key in a few choice words to Mr. Kelso by Mrs. (Jugie) Gorham, of Milton. After the singing of the doxology by all present Mr. Kelso turned the key in the door and formally declared the Home open.
