Obituary

JAMES OWENS. On June 27th, after a short illness of a few weeks, James Owens, son of the late Alexander Owens, passed away at his home on Queen St. Decensed was born in Toronto (Muddy York) on Dec. 31, 1884.

He came to Glen Williams when eighteen years of age, and with the exception of a few years spent in Bolton Village, he lived all his life in this vicinity.

In the year 1888 he was united in marriage to Anna Williams daughter of Jod Williams, and after celebrating their diamond wedding, Mrs. Owens predeceased him one year ago last March.

There is left to mourn the loss of a kind father, one daughter, Mrs. J. F. Gamble, Leney, Sask. and one son J. A. Owens, Georgetown. Deceased was a life long Methodist and in politics a staunch liberal.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon when the remains were laid to rest in Glen Williams cemetery, the service being conducted by Rev. Mr. Trux.

Military News

On Monday of last week F. B. Leslie of the R.A.F., and son of Mr. and Mrs. George Leslie, arrived home from overseas.

Frank went over with the engineers but in London, Toronto, Norval, Ashgrove, Mount Pleasant and Churchville. After a day spent in renewing old acquaintances, the friends separated, having voted to make the event an annual one and having elected a committee to arrange for next year's reunion.

The following item from the Galt paper, relates to Wm. Pagett, an old member of the 20th Batt., and a resident of Stewartstown, who 10 or 12 years ago, viz:— "The French Medal Militaire won by Sergt.-Major W. E. Pagett of this city, has arrived at Militia Headquarters at London and will be presented to him shortly.

During the operation on August 9 at the Amiens front, Sergt.-Major Pagett, then corporal, worked his way up a shallow disused trench to an enemy machine gun post. He killed two of the crew in charge of the gun and the remaining four took prisoners, single-handed. He then turned the gun on the retreating enemy, using it to good advantage and inflicting many casualties.

He was recommended for the Victoria Cross, but was given the French Medal Militaire. He returned home with a party of men off the steamship Llandudno last week. Sergt.-Major Pagett lives at 82 Samuelson street. He is also the possessor of the Distinguished Conduct Medal and enlisted with the 84th Battalion.

It seems that No Man's Mountain, in Southern Arizona, is no more. The name has been changed to Chevrolet Hill. It happens this way. Accompanying Hollingsworth on the trip up the mountain was Edward Banks of Douglas, Ariz. The car was parked on the top of the mountain for two days and nights. At night the lights were turned on and the machine could be seen for miles from across the desert and from the City of Douglas below.

General J. D. L. Hartman, commanding the Arizona district, United States army, rode up the mountain on horseback and was keenly interested in the feat of the little Four-Ninety Model Chevrolet. After the car was exhibited on the mountain top for two days and nights it was driven down. A large crowd gathered to see the machine making its ascent of the rugged butte and a large crowd congregated to see the machine driven down. The trip down was almost as hard as the trip up, but the car reached the foot of the grade without mishap.

Rev. Dr. Ching offered up a prayer of thankfulness for Almighty God for the great victory achieved.

Short speeches followed by Rev. Wm. Bart, Dr. A. W. Nixon, M.P. P., Rev. F. P. Cameron, Mr. Fred Bulo of Chatham and Rev. Mr. Tolan.

Three cheers for the Empire and our returned soldier heroes brought the gathering to a close.
