#### The Georgetown Herald

**GEORGETOWN'S GROWTH** demands a further water supply and our Council are seriously considering ways and means to overcome the deficiency.

Engineer Tremble, who is at the Provincial Paper Mills at present, a member of Council some valuable information at a meeting held last week.

The matter of a greater water supply for our town should not be delayed longer.

THE MAIL ORDER HOUSES have again flooded the country with big handsome gotten up fall catalogues quoting attractive prices on simple articles and making all sorts of big sounding claims for the cash of the out of town resident.

Do not offer to exchange their goods for the farmer's produce. They don't trust a penny's worth, but make the purchaser pay cash before he gets the goods. They pay no taxes into this or any other town or township treasury, by which the schools are maintained, and roads, bridges and sidewalks built. They do not contribute to the churches, charitable institutions, nor to our poor.

Patronize the man who pays taxes to support the schools that make it possible for your children to acquire a first class education.

#### County Council

The county council met at Milton Tuesday. Members all present.

A communication was read from W. I. Dick, County Solicitor, noting that hearing of the Okaville bridge matter by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board had been postponed until the 15th inst.

Lieut.-Col. Noble and Messrs. Finlay, Hunter and McPherson addressed the council, asking that the town line between Esqueping and Chingawacy, from lot 8 to 11, be added to the good roads system.

Morden - Standish - That Halton County Council favors the taking over of that portion of the town line between the townships of Esqueping and Chingawacy between the counties of Halton and Peel, provided that the county of Peel agrees to do likewise and that it is approved by the Department of Highways, and that a committee consisting of the chairman of good roads, the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Esqueping, and the Warden, wait on the Government by the same, together with a committee of Peel - Carried.

Grant - Bridgman - That the Clerk be instructed to forward to the National Patriotic Association at Ottawa a list of amounts paid non-resident dependents by Halton County as a result of Branch No. 1040 being located in Halton, together with a request for repayment of such amounts, and that the Warden and Reeve Cleaver be a special committee to make all arrangements - Carried.

Council went into committee of the whole and considered the several reports presented, which were afterwards adopted by council.

Irving - Standish - That the road and bridge committee dispose of timber and steel rails and material used in the construction of Transloy bridge - Carried.

#### Township Council

Esqueping, Sept. 15, 1919. The Council met pursuant to adjournment, the Reeve in the chair, members all present, the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Hampshire - McDowell, That leave be granted to introduce a by-law to appoint a pound keeper for the village of Norval and that the said by-law be now read the first time - Carried.

Elliott - Thompson, that the by-law to appoint a pound keeper for the village of Norval be now read the second and third times, and passed; that the blank be filled up with the name of James Brown - Carried.

Elliott - Thompson, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to appropriate the interest accruing from the Railway-Rent Fund and that the same be now read the first time - Carried.

Hampshire - Elliott, that the by-law to appropriate the interest accruing from the Railway-Rent Fund be now read the second and third times and passed - Carried.

Hampshire - McDowell, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to assess the school sections of the township of Esqueping and that the same be now read the first time - Carried.

Hampshire - Elliott, that the by-law to assess the school sections of the township be now read the second and third times and passed - Carried.

Hampshire - McDowell, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to assess the township for the year 1919, and that the said by-law be now read the first time - Carried.

Thompson - Elliott, that the by-law to assess the township for the year 1919, be now read the second and third times and passed; that the blanks be filled up as follows: eleven and six tenths mills for County purposes, 2 1/2 mills for township purposes, 2 1/2 mills for general school rates, soldiers' fund one and two tenths mills - Carried.

Hampshire - McDowell, that the by-law to appoint an attendance officer for the township of Esqueping be now read the second and third times and passed, and that the blank be filled up with the name of John A. Tracy, and that he receive the sum of \$100 to be paid quarterly - Carried.

Thompson - McDowell, that the following accounts be paid, Georgetown Herald \$89.92, for printing Voters' Lists, advertising, etc., K. R. Edwards for railings lot 15, 8th line, \$8.65 - Carried.

Elliott - Thompson, that the treasurer pay the following accounts: Canada Ingot Iron Co for two cylinders \$45, J. N. O'Hall for repairs to grinder \$4.45 - Carried.

Hampshire - McDowell, that the treasurer pay P. M. Fisher \$4, for dynamite for blowing out stones on No 10 side road, \$8 for operating crane and \$5 for repairs to crane cart broken on road total \$9, J. A. Tracy postage, etc., in voters lists - Carried.

Hampshire - Thompson, that at the next meeting of the Council a by-law will be introduced to regulate the running at large of cattle on certain portions of highways of the township - Carried.

McDowell - Thompson, that the Council adjourn to meet on October 18 - Carried.

Readhead - Irving - That the Treasurer be authorized to transfer from the good roads interest fund to the good roads salary and miscellaneous account the sum of \$1,200 - Carried.

Readhead - Irving - That whereas under the Good Roads Act there is on deposit in the Bank at credit of the county a considerable sum of money; and whereas the municipality of the Township of Nelson has already expended on good roads in excess of the amount allotted for the year 1919 to the said municipality;

Therefore be it resolved that the Treasurer be and he is already instructed to charge out of the said good roads fund the accounts of the said Township of Nelson ordered to be paid by the road commissioner on the understanding that the representatives of the said municipality of Nelson undertake that the said Township shall repay to the County the said accounts so paid, together with interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum from the date of said payments, and on the further understanding that the Treasurer shall charge against the said Township of Nelson on account of accounts so paid the appropriation as will be due to the said Township of Nelson from the grant given by the Province of Ontario and when the said Provincial grant is received by our Treasurer - Carried.

Inspector Denyes addressed the council re amendments to the School Act.

Council adjourned to meet at the call of the Warden.
