**Referendum Election Oct. 19th.**  
The Ontario Election Act, 1918, provides for the holding of a referendum on the Temperance Referendum Act, 1918.

**PUBLIC NOTICE!**  
Pursuant to the provisions of the Ontario Election Act, 1918, the Board of Registration for the County of Halton, have extended the time for putting in complaints or appeals, in reference to the Voters' Lists, until Thursday the 2nd of October, 1919.
