

By-Law No. -

A BY-LAW to aid SMITH & STONE LIMITED by exempting their property from taxation and providing them with water free of charge for a period of ten years...

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Georgetown has been authorized to enter into an agreement with SMITH & STONE LIMITED...

AND WHEREAS the amount of the rateable property of the Corporation of the Village of Georgetown according to the last assessment roll is \$354,904.45...

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Georgetown enacts as follows:

1. Upon the said Company complying with the terms of the said agreement and subject to the terms and conditions thereof for a period of ten years from January 1st, 1920, the Company's lands and premises described in the said agreement shall be entirely exempt from all Municipal taxation by the said Corporation...

2. This by-law (in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereto) shall take effect from the final passing and ratification thereof. Dated this 28th day of October, 1919.

AGREEMENT Referred to in By-law above written

THIS INDENTURE made in duplicate this 28th day of October, 1919, BETWEEN: SMITH & STONE LIMITED, a Company incorporated under the provisions of the ONTARIO COMPANIES ACT...

WHEREAS the parties hereto are desirous that the Company should carry on the business of Manufacturing Electrical Machinery, Supplies and Accessories or either or any of them within the limits of the Corporation...

AND WHEREAS the Company has for that purpose purchased the lands and premises described in Schedule "A" hereto (hereinafter called the said lands)...

AND WHEREAS the Corporation has accordingly agreed to give the Company certain privileges and concessions hereinafter set out...

NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises the said parties hereto for themselves their successors and assigns consent, promise and agree in and with one another as follows, that is to say:

1. For a period of ten years from January 1st, 1920 (hereinafter called the "said period") the Company shall employ in its business for the first year an average of ten employees for each working day and for the remaining nine years an average of twenty employees for each working day...

2. All the said employees shall be resident in the Village of Georgetown...

3. In the event of fire, accident, strike or any other unavoidable cause which shall cause such an interruption in such case operations shall be resumed as soon as possible and the business of the Company shall be carried on in the same manner as if no such interruption had occurred...

4. All the said employees shall be employed in the Village of Georgetown...

two weeks during each calendar year during the said period for the purpose of taking stock of making repairs and during the said period of two weeks the Company shall be relieved of all its undertakings to employ the number of employees and to pay the quantity of wages hereinbefore set out.

5. During the said period the said Company shall be entirely exempt from all Municipal taxation by the said Corporation either in respect of the said lands or any part thereof or any improvements now or hereafter to be made or erected thereon for the purposes of the said business but not for dwelling house or residential purposes...

6. The Corporation shall annually whenever so requested by the Corporation under this agreement shall make a statutory declaration to the effect that the Company has duly observed and performed all the terms and provisions of this agreement during the year.

7. If the Company should make default under this agreement then the Corporation shall thereupon become liable to pay the Corporation all taxes and water rates which would have been chargeable against the Company if this agreement had not been made and then and thereupon this agreement shall become null and void.

8. The Corporation shall pass such by-laws as may be necessary to carry out the terms of this agreement from time to time and shall when and if necessary have the same ratified, sanctioned and approved by the ratepayers and unless so ratified, sanctioned and approved this agreement shall be null and void.

And that if the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed by-law it will be taken into consideration by the Municipal Council of the said Corporation at a meeting thereof to be held after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of this notice and that such first publication was made on the twenty-ninth day of October, A.D. 1919.

Take notice further that a tenant who desires to vote upon said proposed by-law must deliver to the Clerk not later than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote a declaration under The Canada Evidence Act that he is a tenant whose lease extends for time or which the term of liability is to be created, or in which the money to be raised by the proposed by-law is to be levied on at least twenty-one years, and that he has by the lease covenanted to pay all Municipal taxes and rates on the property of which he is tenant other than local improvement rates.

YEAR RICH IN CENTENARIES

Natal Day Celebrations of Many Famous People Will Take Place During 1919.

This year of grace 1919 is rich in centenaries. To begin with, it is a hundred years since Queen Victoria appeared on the throne of Britain—a centenary concerning which the monthlies will presently be waxing eloquent, London Times notes.

Another noted centenary of the present year is that of the famous old sealer, Admiral Rodney, the man in whom for years the French found an persistent antagonist, so dignity an adversary. "Twas way back in 1781 that this old gentleman first delighted his friends with his presence. The centenary of W. E. Foster, the statesman, will also be celebrated this year.

Greater authorities on literature than this gifted son-in-law of the great Doctor Arnold of Rugby ever breathed. Among other worthies whose names may be mentioned in this connection is that of John Campbell Sharp, the Wordsworthian poet and philosopher; Arthur Hugh Clough, the poet, and Charles Kingsley, the gifted author of that immortal thriller, "Westward Ho!"

Seafarers will presently be doing honor to the memory of another noted individual whose centenary also falls this year—a man worthy of a chapter in the life of the great commander, who it will be remembered, for daring to excommunicate the King, was executed at the guillotine in France, Edinburgh. Neither must we forget George Eliot, the authoress of that unparalleled romance, "Adam Bede."

MADE SCIENCE OF CHECKERS

New Englanders Put Patience on Elevation That Made It Far Above Mere Game.

Those who mention the death of Lyman Stearns, long an agent for the Union, recall always his championship among New Hampshire checker players. It seems a minor matter now, but there was a time when checkers were important, observes Manchester Union.

In old times, when the snow was deep, the papers not what they are now, and the telephone not known, this game, so easy and yet so hard, had its votaries everywhere. A board was at every grocery and in every tavern, always, usually rather thoughtless, but with a mathematical turn of mind, held the honors in each locality. Here and there notable authorities were developed. Able walked miles to play with the others. The merits of center and side attack, of conservation or sacrifice, were widely debated. Now, the dominating thought of the people has become better expressed in baseball. Only a few of the steepest still make the game a pastime.

There is yet to be written a philosophy of games. Why are English-speaking peoples behind the only people, except American Indians, to play baseball? How does it happen that before the war one might see a crowd in France waiting with breathless interest the important strokes in a game of croquet? Why do all the South American nations seem to have little interest in any out-of-door sports, except racing, roving or fighting or bull fighting? Why has India no out-of-door national sport except talking philosophy and religion? Why is Scotland devoted to golf instead of cricket? Why has Germany produced only one or two pugilists of reputation? Why have nations that have devoted most attention to ball playing and pugilism been the dominating ones in commerce and government? Recreation is a product of character expressing itself freely. What does the game of checkers mean? Evidently a contemplative, mildly antagonistic, calculating spirit, delighting in plan campaigns, carry on defense and offense and at the end feel that one made a good contest. That was what the New Hampshire men of past generations delighted to do in life. Some are of that nature still. Some express it with other games. A faction will forever keep the checker board in view. Perhaps they are the kind of men who will remain the conservative, honest and political life.
