

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS, the Prince of Wales, appears to have been in a particularly happy mood in his farewell remarks to the people of Ontario, delivered at a memorable gathering in Toronto last week. His words will live in memory for a long, long time, for they revealed a character devoid of pedantry, yet filled with a broad and touching pride in the position he holds and the Empire he will some day govern.

The Prince touched a popular chord when he declared that the Dominions were no longer "colonies," but sister nations of the British Empire, whose unity is shown by common allegiance to the King. Nicely put, wasn't it, but still tinged with Canadianism, was his declaration: "That is the reason why, if I may be personal for a moment, I do not regard myself as belonging primarily to Great Britain, and only in a lesser way to Canada and the other Dominions. On the contrary, I regard myself as belonging to Great Britain and to Canada exactly the same way. This also means that when I go down to the United States next week I shall regard myself as an Englishman and as a Britisher, but also as a Canadian and a representative of the whole Empire."

No wonder such a declaration brought answering salutes of applause, and no wonder that his highness is the "Prince of Princes" in the estimation of those who have seen him. Canadians reciprocate all the kindly things said by our future king, whose visit cannot fail to strengthen Canada's attachment to the Empire and its affection for the reigning house.

**U.F.O. Recommendation**

J. J. Morrison, Secretary of the U.F.O., thus recommends the Victory Loan to Ontario farmers: "If the farmers of the country are to receive good prices, with a ready market for their products, it is all-important that there should be an over-subscription. **By-Law No. 1**

**A BY-LAW to aid SMITH & STONE LIMITED by exempting their property from taxation and providing them with water free of charge for a period of ten years, and to authorize the Council of this Corporation to enter into an agreement with the said Company for that purpose.**

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Georgetown is desirous to aid SMITH & STONE LIMITED by exempting them from taxation and providing them with free water upon the terms and conditions set forth in the agreement hereinafter referred to, which forms part of this by-law.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the rateable property of the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Georgetown according to the flat rate and assessed assessment roll is \$234,000.45.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole debt due to the said Corporation amounts to the sum of \$50,000.00.

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Georgetown enacts as follows:

1. The Corporation of the Village of Georgetown may make and enter into an agreement with SMITH & STONE LIMITED as hereinafter set forth and forms part of this by-law and the Reeve and Clerk of the said Municipality are hereby instructed and authorized to sign and execute the said agreement and the Clerk of the Corporation is hereby instructed and authorized to affix the Corporate Seal to the said agreement.
2. Upon the said Company complying with the terms of the said agreement and subject to the terms and conditions thereof for a period of ten years from January 1st, 1920, the said Company's lands and premises described in the said agreement shall be entirely exempt from all Municipal taxation by the Corporation either in respect of the said lands or any part thereof or any improvements now or hereafter to be made or erected thereon for the purposes of the said business, but not for dwelling house or residential purposes or in respect of any business which may be carried on upon the said lands in pursuance of the said agreement, or in respect of any income derived from the said lands or premises, and during the said period the Corporation shall free of all charge to the Company supply the Company with 75,000 gallons of water monthly and every month from the Corporation water supply. Provided, however, that the Company shall have no claim whatsoever against the Corporation for damages by reason of any deficiency in

the water supply when such deficiency is caused by any leakage in water-works system or from any other cause beyond the control of the Corporation. And provided further that the said Corporation reserves the right to shut off the supply of water to the said Company in common with all other water users of the Municipality of the said Corporation if it becomes necessary for fire protection purposes, but any leakage will be repaired diligently forthwith.

1. This by-law (in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereto) shall take effect from the final passing and ratification thereof. Dated this 11th day of November, 1919.

**AGREEMENT**

Reference is made to the by-law above written. THIS INDENTURE made in duplicate this 20th day of October, 1919, BETWEEN SMITH & STONE LIMITED, a Company incorporated under the provisions of THE COMPANIES ACT (CANADA), hereinafter called the Company, OF THE FIRST PART, AND THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF GEORGETOWN, hereinafter called the Corporation, OF THE SECOND PART.

WHEREAS the parties hereto agree and declare that the Company should carry on the business of Manufacturing Electrical Machinery, Supplies and Accessories of other or any of them within the limits of the Corporation, and that the Corporation should supply the Company with water free of charge for a period of ten years from January 1st, 1920, hereinafter called the said period.

AND WHEREAS the Corporation has for that purpose purchased the lands and premises described in the Schedule A hereinafter set out and called the said lands.

AND WHEREAS the Corporation has agreed to give the Company certain privileges and concessions hereinafter set out on the terms and conditions hereinafter set out.

NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises the said parties hereto have entered into and agreed to and with one another as follows, that is to say:

1. For a period of ten years from January 1st, 1920, hereinafter called the said period, the Company shall employ in its business for the first year an average of ten employees and for each working day and for the remaining nine years an average of twenty employees for each working day and shall pay in wages to their employees for the first year an average of not less than \$200.00 per week and for the remaining nine years an average of not less than \$400.00 per week unless prevented from so doing by accident, fire, strikes, or other unavoidable cause, in which event the calculations as to the number of employees to be employed and the sums of money to be paid in wages shall be made as hereinafter provided.
2. All the said employees shall be residents of the said Village of Georgetown.
3. In the event of fire, accident, strikes or any other unavoidable cause such as shall cause such an interruption in such case operations shall be resumed as soon as possible thereafter and until business is resumed the Company shall be relieved pro tanto of its undertaking to employ the number of employees and pay the quantity of wages hereinbefore set out.

4. The Company shall have the right to shut down the factory for two weeks during each calendar year of taking stock of making repairs and during the said period for the purpose of the said period the Corporation shall be relieved of its undertaking to employ the number of employees and to pay the quantity of wages hereinbefore set out.

5. During the said period the said Company shall be entirely exempt from all Municipal taxation by the Corporation either in respect of the said lands or any part thereof or any improvements now or hereafter to be made or erected thereon for the purposes of the said business, but not for dwelling house or residential purposes or in respect of any business which may be carried on upon the said lands or in respect of any income derived from the said lands or premises, and during the said period the Corporation shall free of all charge to the Company supply the Company with 75,000 gallons of water monthly and every month from the Corporation water supply. Provided, however, that the Company shall have no claim whatsoever against the Corporation for damages by reason of any deficiency in

the water supply when such deficiency is caused by any leakage in water-works system or from any other cause beyond the control of the Corporation. 8. During the said period the said Company shall be entirely exempt from all Municipal taxation by the Corporation either in respect of the said lands or any part thereof or any improvements now or hereafter to be made or erected thereon for the purposes of the said business, but not for dwelling house or residential purposes or in respect of any business which may be carried on upon the said lands or in respect of any income derived from the said lands or premises, and during the said period the Corporation shall free of all charge to the Company supply the Company with 75,000 gallons of water monthly and every month from the Corporation water supply.
